Regular reminders will be given about this. Anyone self-isolating with symptoms will be encouraged to access and engage with the NHS Test and Trace process. If a symptomatic person comes into school, they will be sent home immediately or isolated until they can be picked up. Isolation to be in meeting room. 999 will be called if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk. In the case of a symptomatic pupil who needs to be supervised before being picked up: • If a distance of 2m can't be maintained, supervising staff will wear a fluid-resistant surgical mask • If contact is necessary, supervising staff will also wear disposable gloves and a disposable apron • If there's a risk of splashing to the eyes, such as from coughing, spitting or vomiting, supervising staff will also wear eye protection	All members of the school community	In Place March 2021	 Testing will be in place for staff from 14th January. This is to test Asymptomatic cases. Staff can access these voluntarily. The initial testing will involve being tested twice, 3 days apart. The aim from then is to provide staff with testing kits so they can test weekly at home. Should a member of staff test positive, they will be

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		Supervising staff will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after the pupil has been picked up. If there are home testing kits available in school, these will be given to parents/carers collecting symptomatic children, and to staff who've developed symptoms at school, if providing one will increase the likelihood of them getting tested. A deep clean will take place in the areas that the symptomatic person has been in, and PPE will be disposed of properly, following decontamination guidance. If the school becomes aware that a pupil or a staff member has tested positive for coronavirus, the school will contact the local health protection team. The team will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who's been in close contact with the person, and these people will be asked to self-isolate. To help with this, records will be kept of: • The pupils and staff in each group, transport • Any close contact that takes place between children and staff in different groups Close contact means: • Direct close contact — face-to-face contact with an infected person for any length of time, within 1 metre, including: • Being coughed on, • A face-to-face conversation, • Unprotected physical contact (skin-to-skin) • Proximity contacts — extended close contact (within 1 to 2 metres for more than 15 minutes) with an infected			isolated and required to take a PCR test. Should this come back negative the member of staff can return to work. A positive PCR test would mean that staff member would need to isolate for 10 days. Any close contacts as established through our track and trace system would also need to self isolate for 10 days.

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		person • Travelling in a small car with an infected person If there are 2 or more confirmed cases within 14 days, or an overall rise in sickness absence where coronavirus is suspected, the school will work with the local health protection team to decide if additional action is needed. Any advice given by the team will be followed.			
Contact with coronavirus when getting to and from school		Where possible, staff and pupils will be encouraged to walk or cycle into school, and asked to avoid taking public transport during peak times if possible. Anyone who needs to take public transport will be referred to government guidance. That only one parent/carer should attend Not to gather at entrance gates or doors, or enter the site unless they have a pre-arranged appointment Anyone wearing non-disposable face coverings when arriving to school will be expected to bring a plastic bag to keep these in during the school day. If they're using disposable face coverings, these will be put in a covered bin. Pupils wearing any sort of face covering when arriving to school will wash their hands on arrival (as all pupils will), dispose of/store the covering, and wash their hands again before going to their classroom. Pupils will be made aware that they mustn't touch the front of the covering during use or removal.

Help will be available for any pupils who have trouble cleaning their hands independently. Skin friendly cleaning wipes can be used as an alternative. Supplies for soap, hand sanitiser and disposable paper towels and tissues will be topped up regularly and monitored to make sure they're not close to running out. 		Items that need laundering will be washed regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, on the warmest water setting. These items will not be shared between children between washes.			
		Pupils and parents/carers will be asked to limit the amount of equipment they bring into school each day to essentials like bags, lunch boxes, hats, coats, books, stationery and mobile phones.			
		Areas of the school that are used by pupils will be cleaned thoroughly at the end of the day.			
		Areas of the school not in use will be shut off to make cleaning more manageable.			

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		Resources, wherever possible should not be shared between groups. Any resources shared between groups, such as sports, art and science equipment, will be either:			
		 Cleaned frequently and meticulously, and always between groups using them; or 			
		 Rotated so they can be unused and out of reach for 48 hours (72 hours for plastics) between use by different groups 			
		The same rules will be followed for books and other shared resources that pupils or staff take home. Unnecessary sharing will be avoided, especially where it doesn't contribute to pupil education and development.			
		Individual and very frequently used equipment, like pens and pencils, cannot be shared.			
		Therapy equipment, such as physiotherapy or sensory equipment, will be cleaned between each use. If this is not possible or practical, it will be:			
		 Restricted to one user/ group; or 			
		 Rotated so it can be unused for 48 hours (72 hours for plastics) between use by different individuals/ groups 			
		Shared rooms, such as halls and dining areas, secondary classrooms will be cleaned between different groups using them.			
		If a person with coronavirus symptoms comes into school, a deep clean will take place in the areas that the person has been in.			
		Cleaning supplies will be topped up regularly and monitored to make sure they're not close to running out.			

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		Teachers will wash their hands and surfaces before and after handling pupils' books.			
Spreading infection due to excessive contact and mixing between pupils and staff in lessons		Primary Pupils will be kept to their class groups and operate as a key stage bubble Pupils in Key Stage 3 & 4 will be kept to their class groups. And operate as a secondary bubble. Where pupils are old enough and capable enough, they will be taught and reminded to maintain their distance and not touch staff or peers. Pupils will be seated side-by-side and facing forwards, and unnecessary furniture will be moved out of classrooms to allow for this. Lessons that involve singing, chanting, shouting or playing instruments (particularly wind or brass instruments) will be limited to no more than 15 pupils, and will take place outside wherever possible (if taking place inside, the space will be well ventilated). Pupils will be positioned either back-to-back or side-to-side at an appropriate distance. Instruments won't be shared. Singing or instrument playing won't take place in any larger groups such as choirs or assemblies. For physical activity, contact sports will be avoided. Outdoor sports will be prioritised where possible, or large indoor spaces used where it is not. Distance between pupils will be maximised as much as possible. Staff can work across different groups in order to deliver the school timetable, but they will keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can (ideally 2 metres apart). 		Any pupils with complex needs or who need close contact care will have the same support as normal as distancing isn't possible here. Staff will be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene. PPE will be available to staff when support pupils in this way.			
		Specialists, therapists, clinicians and other support staff for pupils with SEND should provide interventions as usual. These staff will be advised to be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene.			
		When support pupils learning in class, staff should place themselves by the side of the pupil, facing the same way and this should be done for a minimum amount of time as possible.
