The email address and contact details are monitored on at least a daily basis. Staff/ pupils who are experiencing coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, will not attend the school and advised to self-isolate. Staff/Parent/Carers are advised to arrange a PCR test. Staff and Parents/Carers follow the sickness absence procedure in place at the school -Staff and Pupil attendance records maintained each day. All staff and pupils adhere to any instructions, advice, guidance, and site rules provided to them. Staff and pupils are participating in voluntary Lateral Flow Device testing twice weekly during the autumn term. Staff will be advised to test daily if an outbreak occurs. Testing will be in place for staff and pupils returning to school. This is to test asymptomatic cases. Pupils will be offered two tests initially in school when they return in September. Pupils will then be provided with testing kits so they can test twice weekly at home. Staff provided with testing kits so they can test twice weekly at home. The booster vaccine programme

The JCVI has published advice on the vaccine booster programme. It recommends that "individuals who received vaccination in Phase 1 of the COVID-19 vaccination programme (priority groups 1 to 9) should be offered a third dose COVID-19 booster vaccine. In schools this includes:

- All adults aged 50 years or over
- all those aged 16 to 49 years with underlying health conditions that put them at higher risk of severe COVID-19 (as set out in the green book: COVID-19: the green book, chapter 14a GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)), and adult carers
- adult household contacts (aged 16 or over) of immunosuppressed individuals"

Staff will be invited to book a vaccine by the NHS at least 6 months after their second dose if it is recommended for them.

Vaccines for 12-15 year olds

The JCVI has published advice on the vaccine booster programme for 12-15 year olds.

School to facilitate the NHS coming in to offer vaccines to pupils with parental consent. This will take place in the Autumn Term.

CO2 monitors

We have received C02 monitors but no guidance as yet. We will deploy these as soon as we have the guidance.

To help with identifying close contacts,

Records will be kept of:

- The pupils and staff in each group, transport
- Any close contact that takes place between children and staff in different groups

Close contact means:

- Direct close contact face-to-face contact with an infected person for any length of time, within 1 metre, including:
 - -Being coughed on,
 - -A face-to-face conversation,
 - -Unprotected physical contact (skin-to-skin)
- Proximity contacts extended close contact (within 1 to 2 metres for more than 15 minutes) with an infected person
- Travelling in a small car with an infected person
- Consideration be given to creating more space with seating plans in classrooms and rotas implemented if necessary to manage outbreaks.

Staff should continue to follow any additional precautions advised by their clinician. Staff who were previously shielded to be made aware that a booster vaccine programme is expected to be rolled out from September 2021.
