The aim of this course: **Forest School** is a unique educational experience and process that offers pupils the opportunity to succeed and develop confidence, self-esteem and resilience through hands-on learning experiences in a woodland environment. Forest School embraces holistic learning through play and exploration; students learn about the natural environment, how to handle risks and to use their own initiative to create, solve problems and cooperate with others. In Forest School the emphasis is on pupil led learning. Forest school is a long-term process across all the seasons, it takes place in a natural environment and is led by qualified Forest School Leaders who continuously maintain and develop their professional practice.
