

We explored different foods when we learnt about Lunar New Year, Prawn crackers were a popular treat.














Apple Class


School Council


Comic Relief - Friday 21st March Pupils were invited to wear red on Friday 21st March, and bring in a voluntary donation of £1. Over £100 was raised!!



Easter Cake Sale School council will be organising an Easter Cake Sale on Friday 4th April. A letter will go home soon asking for Easter themed home baked goodies!


<u>Your Voice</u> A recent survey that tutors completed showed:

As an outcome School Council will be sharing a range of playground games that can be played with their tutors very soon!




Uno Tournament





Year 7 have been working excitedly to hone their <u>Map Skills</u>, looking at birds eye view, symbols and compass direction.

Year 9 are engaged in the topic of <u>**Pollution**</u> and have enjoyed learning about types of pollution and the negative impacts it is having on our world.




English



In Year 7 we have been looking at the text The Iron Man by Ted Hughes. Pupils have completed story boards, written speech bubbles and character descriptions and have created a menu for the Iron Man.

Pupils have also participated in weekly Makaton sessions, played games and been building on their phonological skills.









In Year 8 we have been looking at non-fiction texts and fact finding based around the theme of British Wildlife. We have learnt about conservation and the dangers our wildlife face. Pupils made 'Say No to Plastic pollution' posters and researched facts about their chosen animal. We had a visit from Brent Lodge Wildlife Centre where pupil's enjoyed finding out about how wild animals are cared for and released back into the wild.



English

Year 9 have been learning about The Tempest by William Shakespeare in English. The pupils have completed comprehension questions on the text. They have discussed plot, character and the setting of the story. We have looked at a mixture of the original text and simplified text.

A group of Year 9s visited Waterstones in Chichester to use their World Book Day vouchers. Some even enjoyed reading their books in the gardens afterwards.

8JB have been learning about the life of Jesus. The involves reading the stories in the Bible or looking at the places were Jesus lived.






Science

Year 7 are learning about Electricity and Electrical Circuits within practical contexts. They have explored static electricity as the build up of charges (electrons). When there is an imbalance in the number of electrons in atoms, attraction or repulsion takes place as shown in the pictures below:



Year 8 are learning about forces and their effects with respect to change in direction, motion and change in shape. They have explored friction on different surfaces and the forces involved when an object floats or sinks in water - Upthrust and Weight as shown in the pictures below:





Science

Year 9 are learning about materials, properties and applications. In addition, the pupils are exploring chemical reactions within practical contexts. The pictures below show pupils classifying materials and carrying out an experiment between vinegar and bicarbonate of soda.



Year 10 continue their coursework by exploring the effect of voltage input on current output using a power pack with a adjustable voltage. The below pictures show the pupils recording their data and analysing the results obtained.







In KS4 our students will have the opportunity to work towards either an Entry Level certificate or an ASDAN qualification. This will involve taking part in different sporting activities to acquire the evidence needed, which is either video or photographic, and will include team games and individual sports. Here are some students working together in football and practicing their hand- eye coordination.


10A Achievements

Our Year 10 and 11 students have been enjoying our recent experiences designed to develop greater self confidence and independence.


Students have engaged very positively in 'Travel Training', completing a return rail journey to Littlehampton or a train and journey to Bognor.
