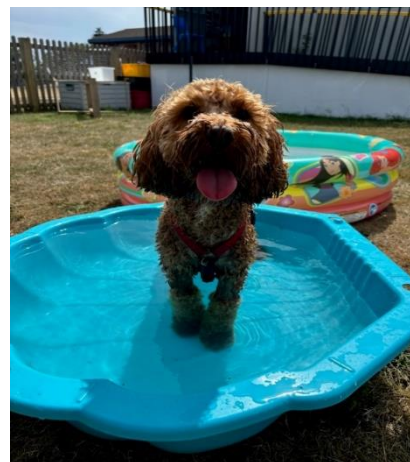

Chestnut classes were very proud to be a part of our Sports Day. We took part in group games, listened to instructions and most importantly had fabulous fun!



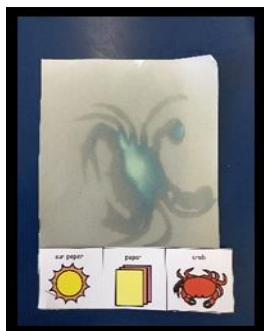

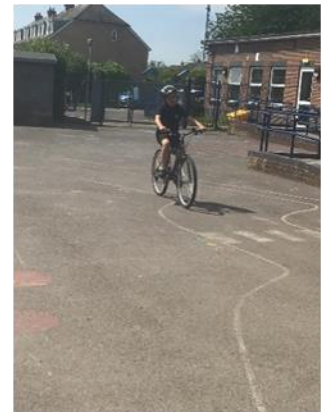

The class have been learning food related Makaton signs. Willow is making a sign for 'pineapple'



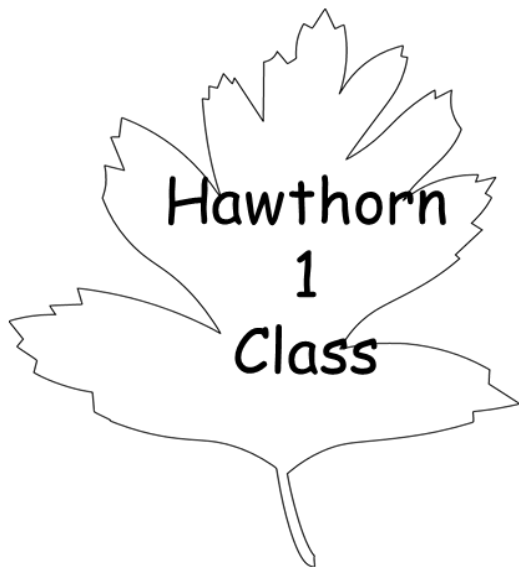

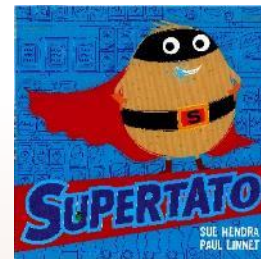
Our topic this term has been 'Food and Farming'

Our learning has been focused on **Watery World** topic.

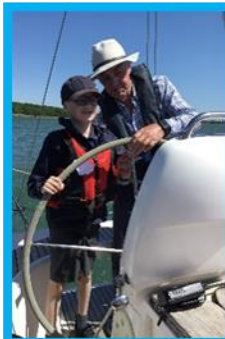
We have explored water cycle, extreme weathers and the process of filtration and erosion. We also have conducted interesting water experiments.

Year 5 relished taking part in Kids on the water adventure.

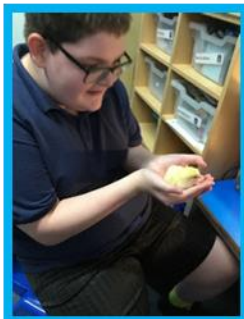
We also enjoyed our watery narrative *The Snail and the Whale* and *Selkie*.

The Year 9s have been using Micro Bits to create a range of coding projects.



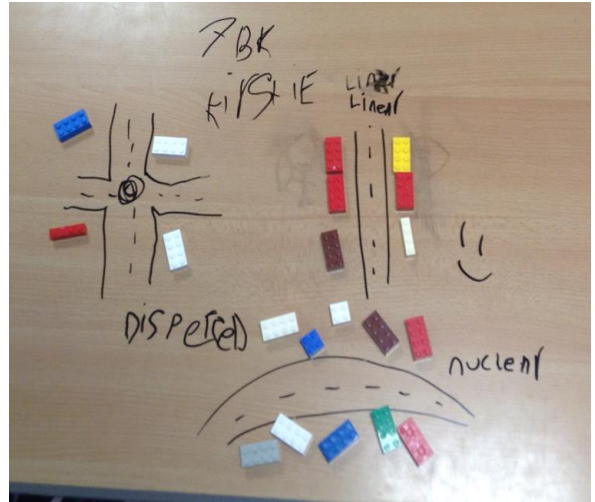
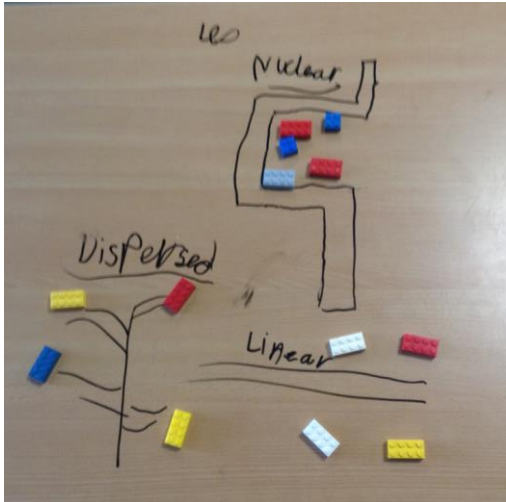
Duke of Edinburgh

Year 7 have been busy this term studying all about **Settlements**, recreating patterns using LEGO.



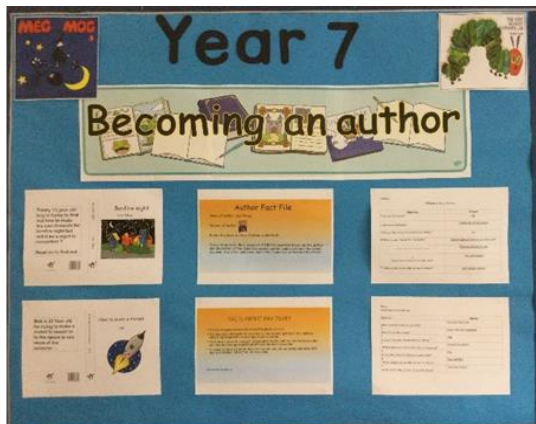

English

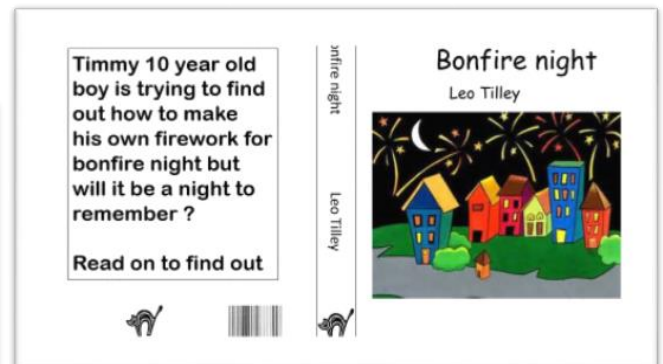

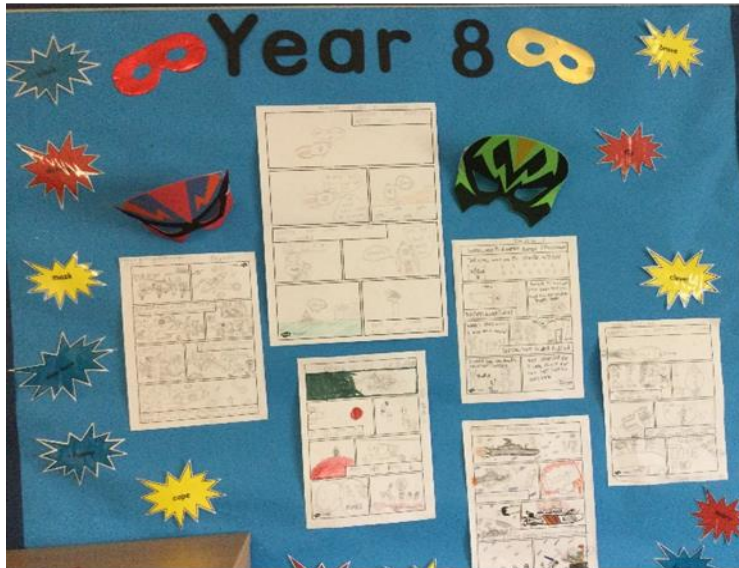

Food Technology

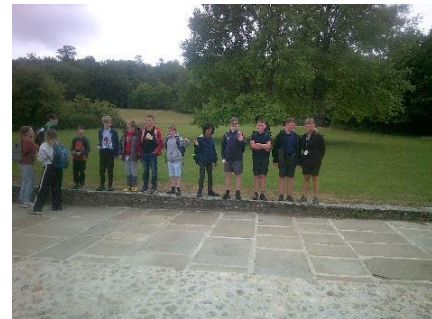

History KS3

Year 7 visit to the Weald and Downland Living Museum

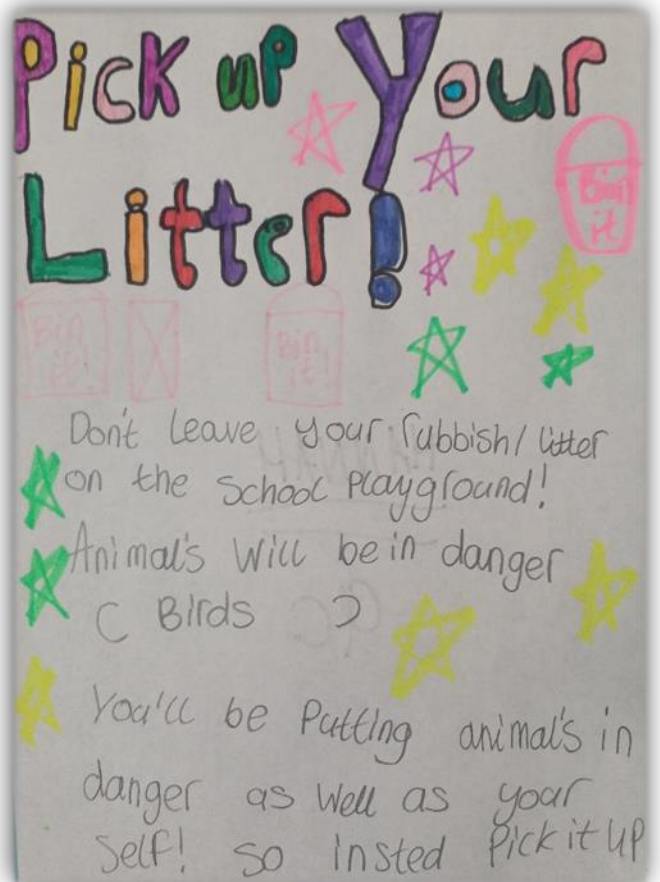
Land Based Studies

The Land Based Studies Year 10 group have been learning techniques in order to keep the vegetables they are growing healthy as well as lots of watering. The course has also taught them about lots of different weeds and pests and how to control them. They have also been clearing an area, measuring and marking out an area for creating a new seed bed as well as weeding other areas and then adding bark to keep the weeds under control. In the next few weeks they will continue to harvest some of the vegetables they have grown and keep maintaining the area.



In PSD this term we have focused on **'Living in the Wider World'**.

This is a time for us to reflect on what qualities are needed to become healthy, independent and active participants of society. We have focused on British Values, Human Rights, online safety and how to care for our environment.

Religious Education

8S have been learning about Islam. In this lesson they acted out the story of Muhammed.



Muhammed was a businessman who spent a lot of time in the desert with his camel - superbly played by Franklin. One day the Angel Gibril (played convincingly by Willow), told Muhammed that Allah had big plans for him.



7BK have been investigating the link between art and religion. In this lesson they painted their own interpretations of Jesus on The Cross.



Science

Year 7 are exploring organisms and classification using their structural features. They have learnt about characteristics of organisms, five main classes of organisms and they are presently learning about the two main kingdom of classification. They would be progressing on this in year 8 Autumn term where they will be learning about Invertebrates.



Year 8 are exploring acids and alkalis within practical context. They have been able to identify household substances that are acidic or alkaline. In addition, they carried out simple experiment to identify some properties of acids using dilute $\text{HCl}_{(\text{aq})}$ as shown in the pictures below:



Science

Year 9 continued to explore chemical reactions within practical contexts and related these reactions to their applications in real world. They would progress to exploring Neutralisation reactions and their applications at KS4.



Year 10 continued their coursework by learning energy and energy transfer. The pupils had the opportunity of visiting the sensory garden to explore how kinetic energy of the wind and light energy from the sun (renewable) are transferred to electrical energy.

Our Year 10s have been working on leadership roles during their lessons and have ran this years school games days for the whole school.

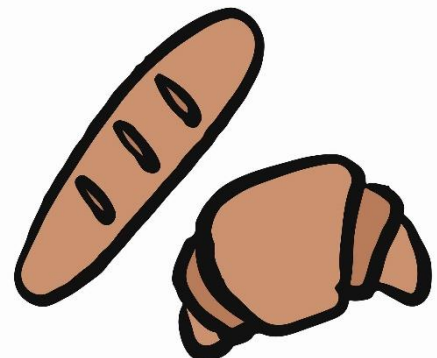
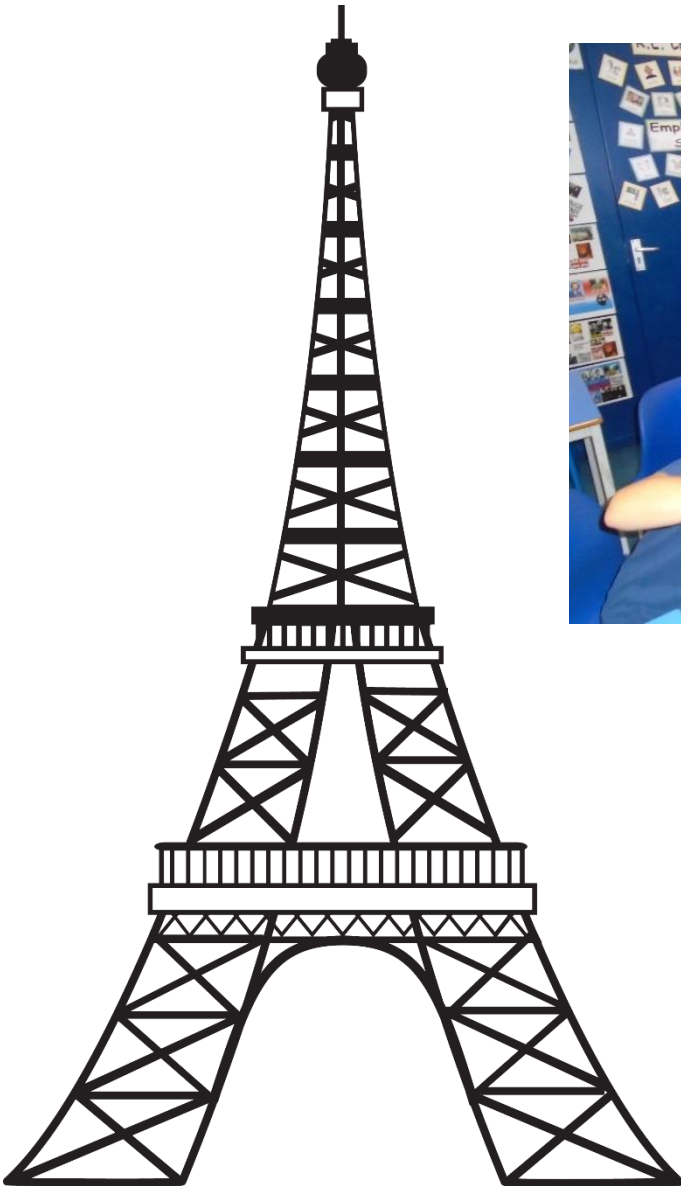
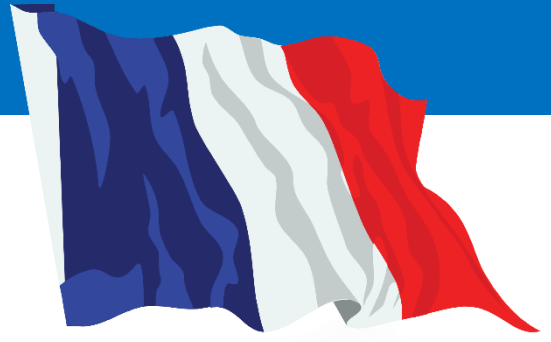
Sussex Cricket 2025

Speech & Language Therapy

Topic in focus 'Blanks levels of questioning'

Within school we use the 'Blanks levels of questioning' framework to help support our pupils. This is a framework that looks at levels of questioning from simple and concrete to more difficult and abstract questioning.

They are helpful as:

- They ensure realistic expectations and identify what the child is able to respond to
- They help adults adjust their own language to an appropriate level for the child
- They help the child develop inferencing and reasoning skills
- They can help manage social misunderstandings and development of social skills.

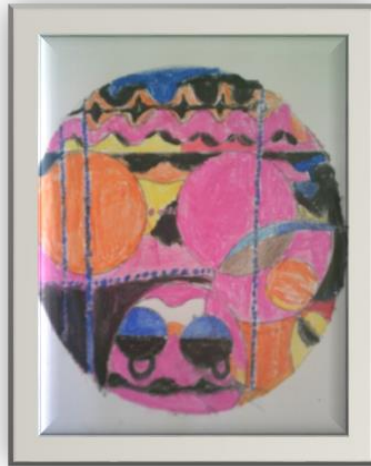

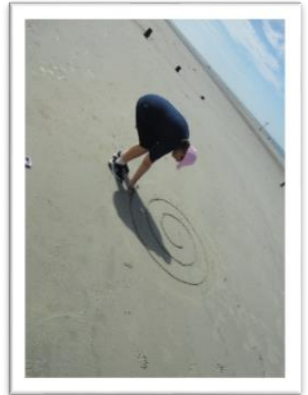

Special School Menu 2025/26



Special School Meal Information

Welcome to your new School meals menu for 2025/26. School meals are free for all pupils in Reception, Year 1, and Year 2 and for pupils who are entitled to Free School Meals. For pupils in other years meals can be ordered and paid for via the school.

Catering Services work with the Lead Association for Catering in Education (LACA) to ensure that our menus comply with the Government's School Food Standards. We have reduced sugar, salt and fat content on our menu and support local suppliers providing fresh meat and vegetables. Our meals are produced in school by our award-winning teams to support your child's lunchtime experience. We have recently partnered with ProVeg helping to make changes to our menu that can have a significant impact on children's health and the health of the planet.

How do I order and pay for a School meal?

All meals must be ordered via your school payment system please contact your school administrator. If you are entitled to Free School Meals or your child is in Reception, Year 1 or 2 the school will order for you direct to Catering Services and you do not need to contact the school after your initial order.

What happens if my child is sick and cannot attend School?

Please contact the school office as soon as possible to inform them your child will be absent and will not require their meal.

What happens if my child has a school trip?

Free School Meals and pupils in Reception, Years 1 & 2 will be provided with packed meals on trip days, the school will order directly with Catering Services. Paid meals should be ordered with your school as usual.

What if I require a special medical diet?

We can work with you and the school to support a medically prescribed special diet. Please ask for a Special Diet Request form from the school office, once completed return with the medical evidence to the school office. This request will then be passed to and reviewed by the Catering Services team and where possible a special diet meal will be provided.

How much does a school meal cost?

A school meal is currently £2.85, this may be subject to change in September 2025.

Free School Meals Eligibility

We would like to remind you that some families are entitled to Free School Meals. There are two important reasons why families should register for Free School Meals:

- students who are eligible receive a fresh nutritious hot Free School Meal every day.
- schools receive additional funding from the government for each eligible student who claims the Free School Meal allowance, even if the student does not regularly eat a meal.

The process for parents to submit applications for Free School Meals is now entirely online, and so schools will be unable to provide hardcopy forms or submit your application form for you. This system gives families an instant indication as to whether their child is eligible for Free School Meals and ensures that eligible children receive their entitlement as quickly as possible.

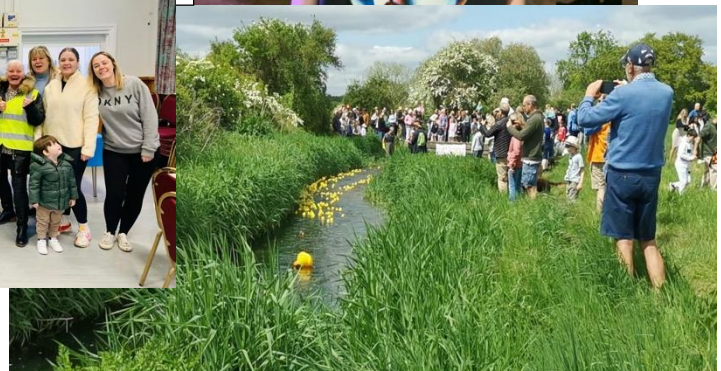
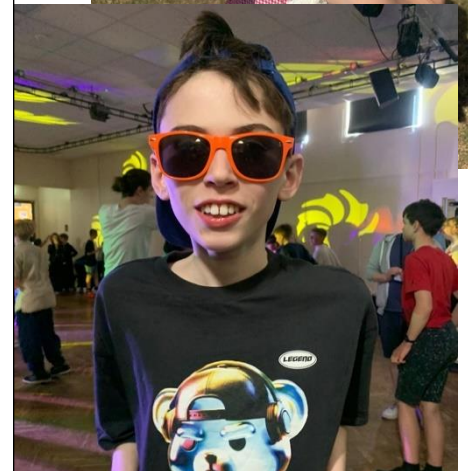

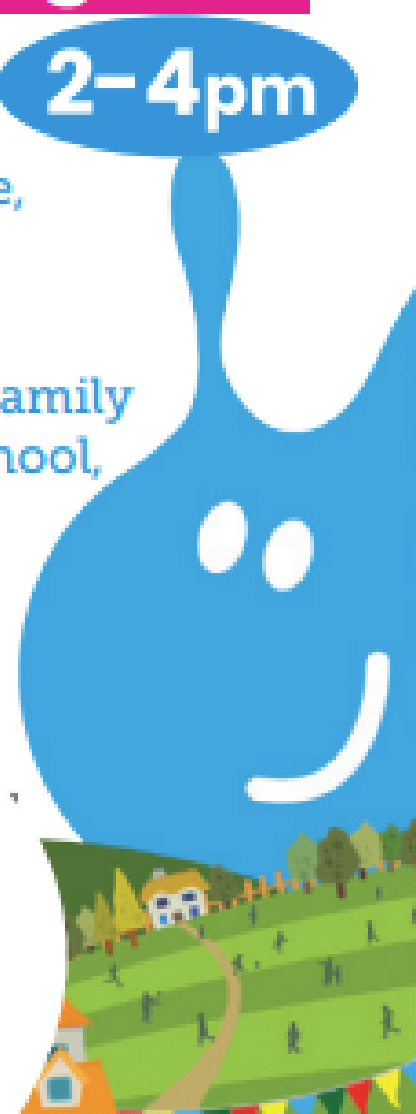
